

















Wednesday 28 September is a great morning at the Park Centre! 10am 11.30am —12.30 pm

Knit and Knatter

Yellow Bin day is the day each fortnight a group of 20 in-knitters meet between 10 -12 at the Park Centre to knit and to enjoy a chat. There are the 16 out-knitters, who for various reasons can't make it to the gathering.

So far this year the group has made 961 garments. These have been given to various wards in the hospital which includes the children's medical, surgical, acute assessment and child cancer wards, neonatal units, birthing suite, maternity ward, and whanau ward. Men's and women's shelters benefit from these gifts as well as the local kindergarten and people within the community. Last year 1476 garments were knitted by this hard-working group. Each knitter puts their creativity and imagination into each garment they knit. They are certainly made with love.

I enjoyed meeting Sue who oversees this group along with her team Trish, Wendy, and Mary-who started Knit and Knatter 15 years ago. Sue shared it was her grandmother who taught her to knit and her first knitting was for her sister's doll. Sue has knitted all her life; her children and grand children have all learned this craft.

Each year a lunch is put on for the all the knitters as well as those who support this work to celebrate what has been achieved and to honour and thank everyone. New members are welcome.
